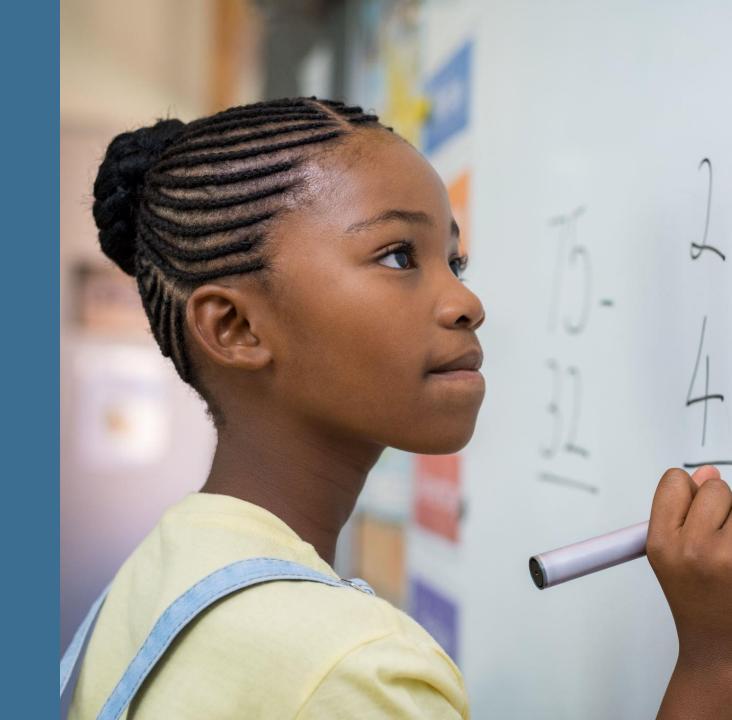
The budget is a set of inputs and outputs (money coming in and going out).



The budget is a statement of our values.

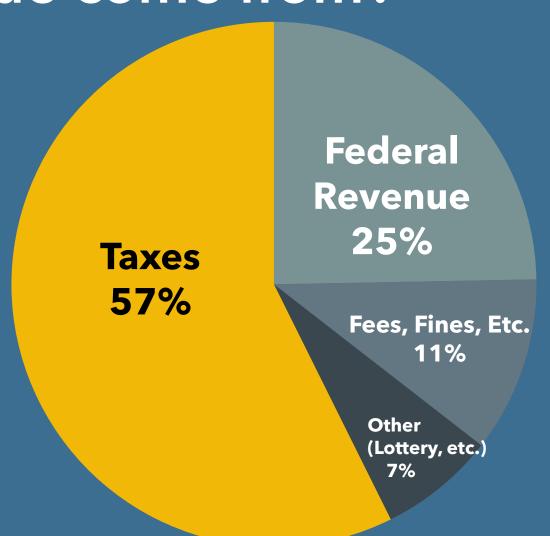
It's a set of choices we make about the kind of community we want. Which communities and services deserve funding?

Current Budget Highlights

 Implementing year 4 of the Student Opportunity Act in FY 2025 - added funding for minimum aid and a small amount to increase the count of low-income kids.

 No progress on the Chapter 70 inflation fix to catch up districts to extraordinary cost growth of the past 3 years (more on this later).

Key Fair Share programs like universal free school meals continued.
 With only \$1.3B in Fair Share budgeted in FY 2025 compared to up to \$2.4B raised from the tax, potential to do much more.

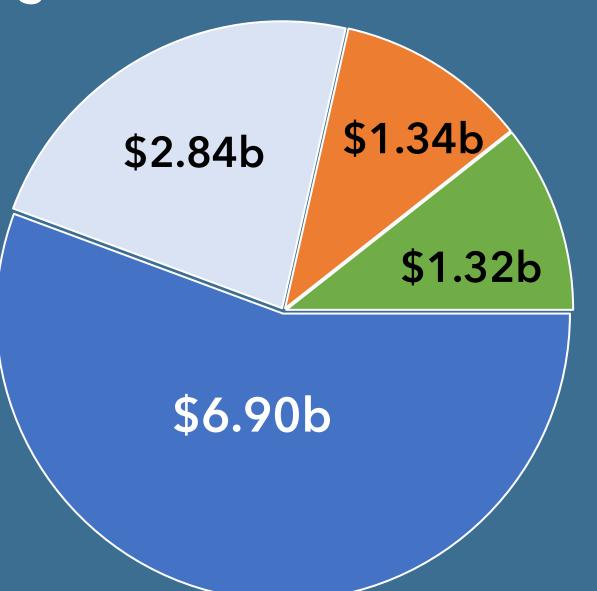


Breaking Down the K-12 Education Budget

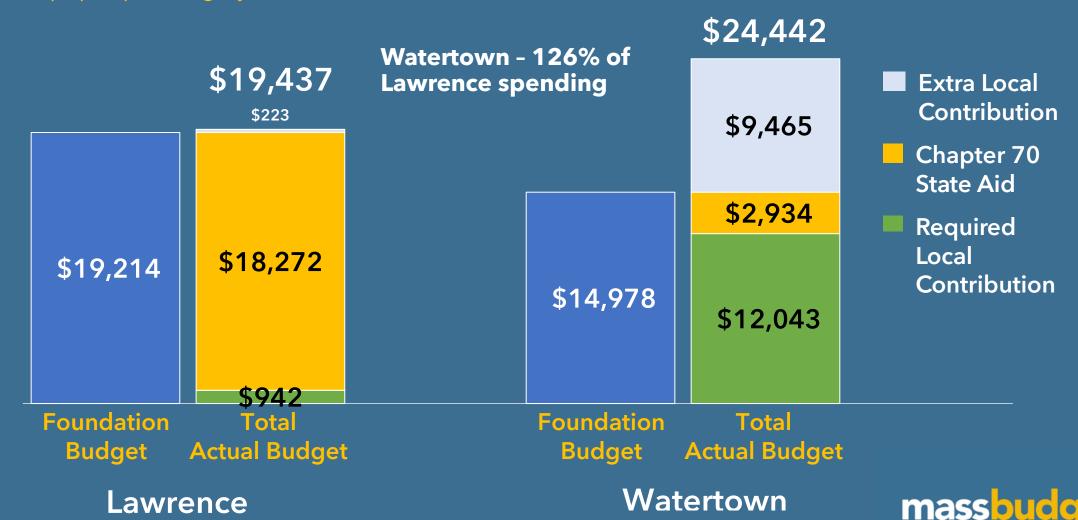

Per pupil spending by revenue source, FY 2024

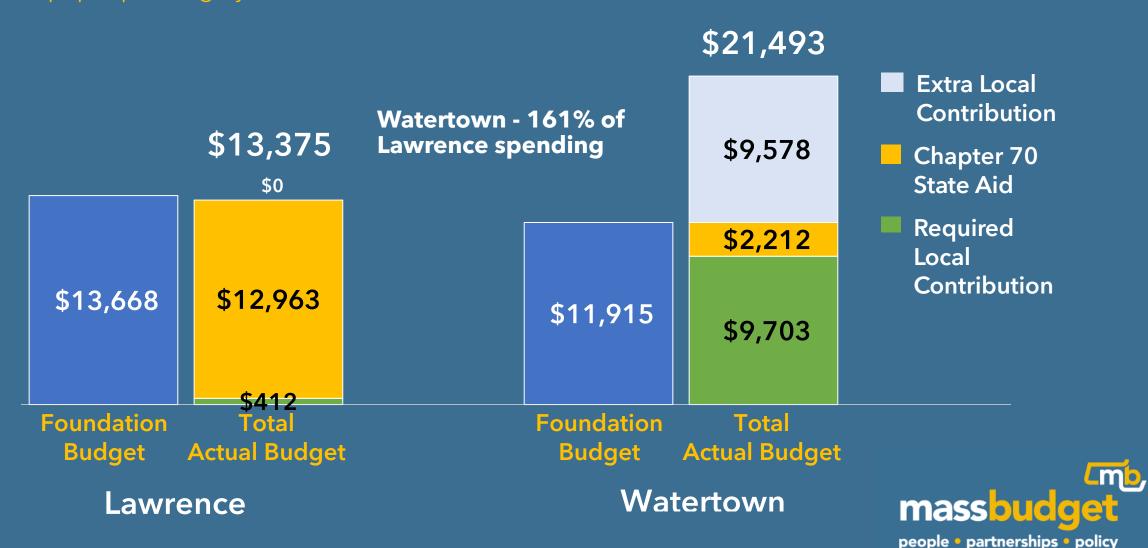

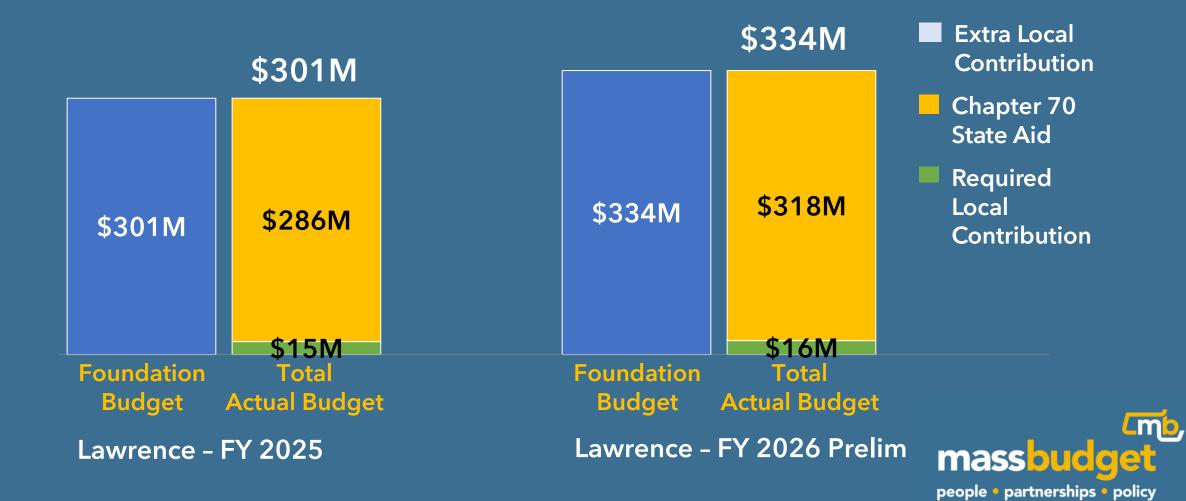
K-12 Funding Disparities Were Larger Before SOA

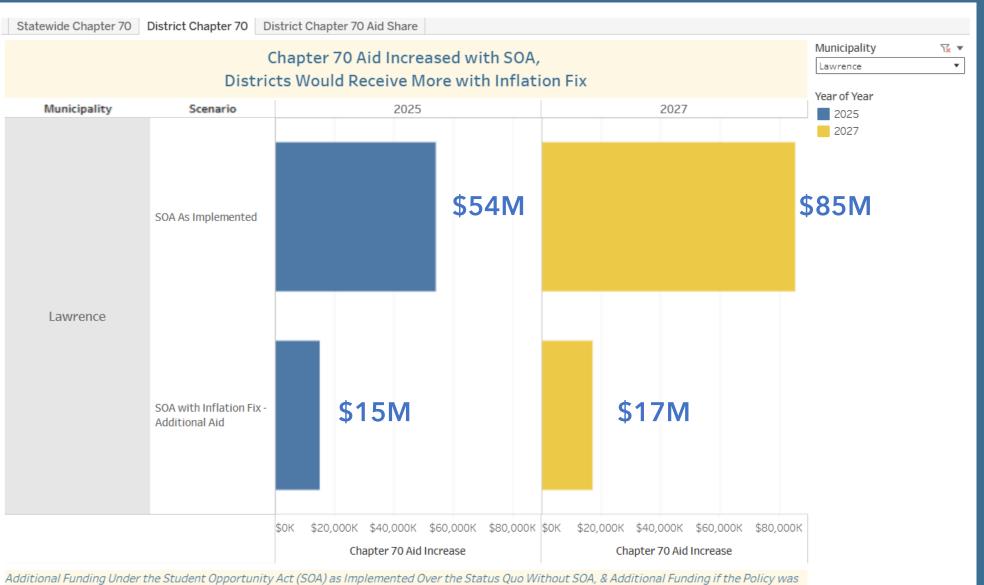
Per pupil spending by revenue source, FY 2020

Required spending by revenue source, FY 2025 - FY 2026 Preliminary

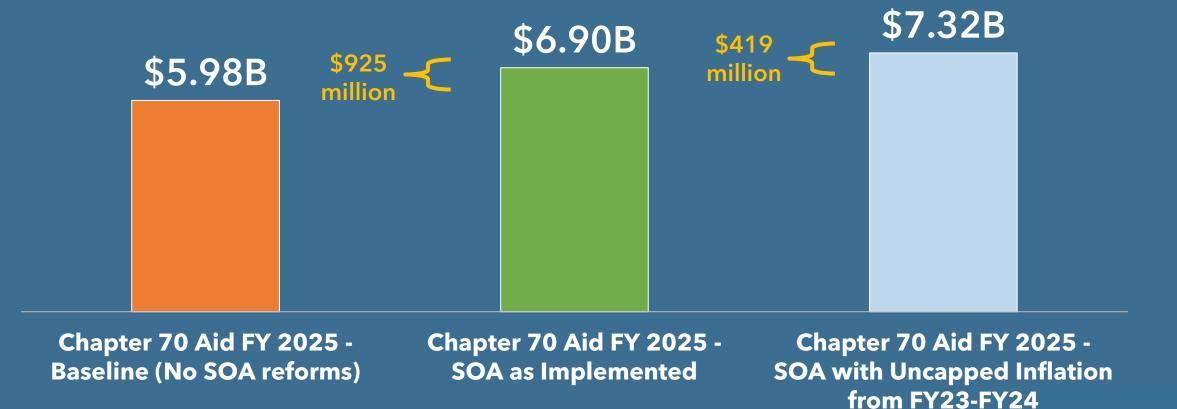




Additional Funding Under the Student Opportunity Act (SOA) as Implemented Over the Status Quo Without SOA, & Additional Funding if the Policy was Fully Adjusted to Inflation, by District, FY 2025 and FY 2027 (projected)

Overall Picture - SOA Increasing Aid by \$925M Annually through FY25, Inflation Fix Would Increase Aid by \$419M

Statewide Chapter 70 Aid FY 2025 – baseline projection without SOA reforms, GAA SOA reforms as implemented, SOA reforms with uncapped inflation through FY 2025





K-12 Funding in the Governor's Budget Plans

 Implementing year 5 of SOA in FY 2026 - Gov. proposals also included \$275M in new grants to support growing K-12 costs - transportation, special education, school buildings

 Not directly addressing a key root cause of under-inflated K-12 funds to school districts, dealing more with downstream problems

 Coming around on Fair Share - Gov. FY 2026 budget raises millionaire tax resources to \$1.95B and has companion bill to use prior year unspent funds of \$1.32B

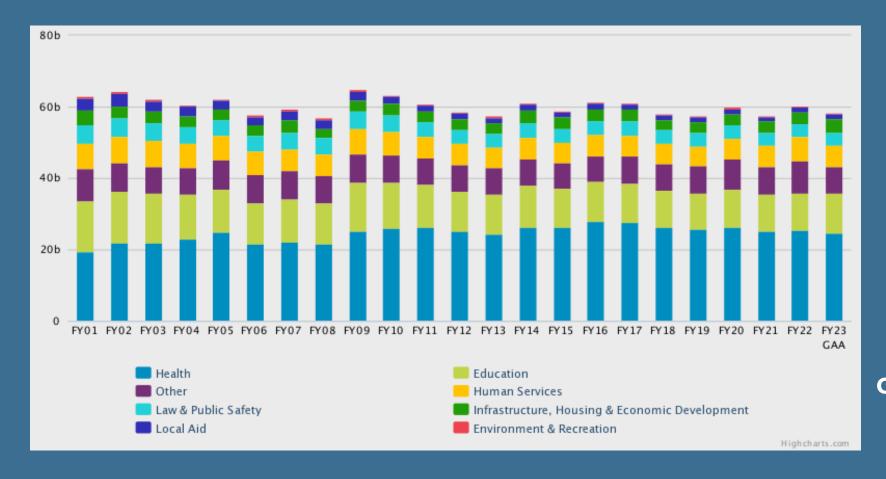


K-12 Funding - Next Steps

- All districts are facing a challenging environment, need for more services and support, high costs, gaps left by expired COVID funds
- Options to consider through the rest of the budget process and legislative session
 - 1. Fix Chapter 70 inflation statewide, likely with multi-year phase-in
 - 2. Invest more in grant programs in areas like transportation, special education, rural aid, and school building to ease pressure on city budgets, provide more options to cover costs
 - 3. Longer term convene a commission to look at structural issues in K-12 funding generate proposals for the next 5 years
